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Do people get lazy in a Welfare State?

Father Illtud Evans, O.P., distinguished editor of Blackfriars, British journal of opinion, answers from experience in the accompanying article questions often raised about what happens to charity and personal initiative in a Welfare State. His answers may surprise many American readers who have heard and read alarming distortions about the effects of socialized medicine in England.

"I am not a Christian, you know, but I'm not one of those agnostics with an anti-Catholic chip on my shoulder."

Such was Aneurin Bevan's greeting to me in the House of Commons, when I had been asked to meet him by one of his closest friends, himself a Catholic and a "Bevanite" I labor member of parliament.

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Charity is more than handouts

TOLEDO, Ohlo—Charity toward one's neighbor demands both individual effort and community effort, Archbishop Karl J. Alter of Cincinnati told delegates to the convention of the National Conference of Catholic Charities.

Your function is to exemplify and exercise the spirit of Chris-Your timetion is to exemplify and exercise the spirit of Chris-tian solidarity in human society," the Archibishop told the delegates in a sermon delivered at a Pontifical Mass in the Cathedral of Our Lady Queen of the Most Holy Rosary. Archibishop Alter declared that "in the Christian concept of society, all are responsible for the whole" and "the individual re-sponsibility is to promote the common interest of all."

The Archibishop then recalled that the recent encyclical, "Mater et Magistra" of His Holiness Pope John XXIII "re-emphasizes this need of a socialization of efforts."

"mention this relationship between individual and social responsibility," he continued, "because a clear recognition of the faets involved constitutes the basis of all good social work or Christian charity.

"Social work had its origin in an understanding of the fact that many of the problems which affect the well-being of the individual—whether it be poverty, or disease, or disendency of any kind—can be traced in part to social causes. ..., Scientific social work is not an inviduous reflection on the genuine spiril of charity, but rather its rational implementation, Charity, to be genuine, must be an intelligent service to our neighbor, not a brush off with some passing alms."

passing alms."

The Archbishop explained that "charity is a thing of the spirit," and "social work a thing of the mind," and "the two are not in opposition but are complementary to each other."

"I mention these things for two reasons," Archbishop Alterstated. "The first is that we must never lose sight of the fact that is the spirit of Christ which must infuse all social work to make it meritorious,... The second reason is that there is a growing tendency to minimize individual responsibility and over emphasize social responsibility in the cause of human welfare. The right attuited is one of balance... In a word, there must be individual responsibility to match a program of social responsibility."

Birth control

"Let's take birth control out of politics" is the title of a recent Look magazine article by Rev. John A. O'Brien, Research Professor of Theology at Notre Dame University. It is a good title because, as he so rightly says, the issue is a sharply divisive and nettlesome one in the social life of our nation. Legitimate sensibilities are being ridden over roughshod by both sides.

We all know the art and practice of politics in the resolution of public issues is a matter of setting up pressures on one side or the other, of trying to have one pressure prevail over the other or, failing that possibility, of achieving a temporarily stable equilibrium between them.

We all know, too, that the pressures are set up by partisan statements; by publicity to attract the weight of incompletely informed popular opinion; by the use of slogans which, of their nature, are designed rather to have a striking effect than to be truly accurate. This rough and ready method, useful enough in such as the determination of tax questions, will simply not do in a matter which is deeply intimate in the personal lives of individuals.

deeply intimate in the personal lives of individuals.

This, unfortunately, seems to have been the trend in public discussions of the question of family limitation, its necessity in different circumstances and the right method of attaining it. During deroble public heat and excitement generated by the slogan "population explosion." Yet, at the International Population Conference at New York University last week, the concept was declared by the experts to be a complete myth, without any scientific basis. It was pointed out, among other things, that it is not biologically possible for the world population growth to exceed 3 per cent per annum; that this rate cannot be regarded as "explosive" in any field of human activity and certainly not in this field. Besides there have been much more "explosive" advances in the science and technology of providing for present and future human needs.

There is agreement between all shades of religious opin-

There is agreement between all shades of religious opinion on the desirability of family limitation in certain circumstances. The disagreement is on the means, whether the use of mechanical or chemical devices to prevent conception, and indeed the use of surgery to abort it, can be justified either morally or medically.

The questions at issue are theological, moral, medical and social. They should be determined on these bases—all of the bases logether, not one at a time. They should certainly not be determined by the popular "consensus of opinion" which is so often more successfully influenced by the demogogic coiners of slogans than by those who really know what they are talking about.

Laws and protests

As our readers will recall, fifteen Episcopal clergymen including three Negro clergymen, were recently tried a convicted in Jackson, Miss. The crime: an attempt to ditogether in a segregated restaurant. The punishment: fine of \$200 plus a four-month term in jail for each.

In a speech in the U.S. Senate, Senator John C. Stennis (D.Miss.) characterized the elergymen's action as a breach of the peace. The truth is, the elergymen offered no vio-lence and the bare circumstance of their arrest by the police was the closest approach there was to a breach of the

The senator's principal argument was that "there is a roper way to protest and make known a stand on any sub-ect," and "the way to do so is not to violate the law in rder to express yourself that way."

The senator forgot to mention that there is also a proper way to receive and deal with protests, an essential part of the democratic process we are all so proud of. In his and other states in the South, there are many laws which, being contrary to elementary morality and justice in human relations, are standing incitements to a "breach of the peace." These laws have been protested for many, many years, both by citizens within the Southern states and elsewhere in the United States—of which, as the senator might remember, the southern states form a part. The protests were consistently either ignored or denied and, in many cases, the protesters were beaten up. There have even been some killings.

The general tenor of these laws, also, are against the known public policy of "We, the People—," Many of them have become clear stumbling blocks to the development of some U.S. policies abroad. Many of them, especially recently, have been enacted in deliberate, declared defiance of laws enacted by the U.S. Congress.

Unlike the Ku Klux Klan, the Episcopal clergymen have been protesting positive laws which contravene superior laws. As most people in the United States will agree today, the anti-segregation laws are clearly immoral and, moreover, have been declared contrary to the U.S. Constitution.

These anti-segregation laws are exactly the same in principle as the enti-segregation laws are exactly the same in principle as the enti-segregation laws against Jews in Nazi Germany, and the methods of their enforcement have some very disturbing similarities. It might be interesting if the Democratic Senator from Mississippi and the Indianapolis Star would also compare the Episcopal clergymen with the very few courageous people who defied the laws in Germany at one time, laws enacted with every trapping of legality and the "normal" administration of government.



Q. Can some qualified person answer the question whether a Catholic may attend the wedding of a diverced non-Catholic and another non-Catholic. I was under the Impression that, diverce being wrong even for non-Catholics, we should not attend remarriages. This has come up because I read in the Sunday paper that a Catholic relative of the President is expected to attend the wedding of an embessador and a divorces.



A. I am presuming myself to be qualified; but I insist that I have no intention of playing censor for the actions of all the Kennedy relatives. Ever since a Catholic got in the White House my questions have indicated a hypercritical and metodiesome attitude about the religious lives and activities of his wife, brothers, sisters and inclaws. Does Jacks go to Mass? How can her sister be final ried to Raddwill? And so on. So far our President has had no trouble with Protestants and Jews, and I have the impression that our bishops, who have opposed him forcefully on school aid, retain great respect for his frimness of conviction. But now to your questions: In ordinary circumstances a Catholic may not attend the remarriage of a divorced person. The main reasons are: (1) that he is apt to give scandal by contributing to the impression that divorce is acceptable, and that he personally does not find it objectionable; and (2) that he may cooperate in sin by giving it seeming approval.

Now it is possible to imagine cases in which those two objections could be eliminated, and in which there would be sound reason for attendance. Official duty or exceptional requirements of social courtesy might be sound reason; but it would still be necessary to make sure that people did not misinterpret the meaning and purpose of your attendance. My practical rule would be this: play safe and do not attend if you can reasonably avoid it; but if you think yours is a special case, talk it over with a priest who can help you evaluate all the factors and come up with a prudent answer.

Q. I would like to know if ladies and girls are supposed to go in Church during Holy Mass with just a ribbon on the side of their hair, or hair bands a half-linch or an inch wide, or only vells. It seems to me people are getting more careless in many respects with our Lord. The way the world is going I think we should get closer to Christ instead of further away.

I am not advocating disregard for law, but reasonable interpretation of it. Certainly women should have some sort of covering on their heads when they go to church, especially for Mass and Communion. But as I have often said before, I don't think a girl who happens to pass by a church should omit a visit just because she doesn't have a sombrero handy. And I am perfectly willing to let custom interpret how wide a hand should be to constitute a covering.

Q. Please answer this question: The children tell us they are taught they are allowed to chow the Sacred Host at communion. They say the Lord said: "Take ye and eat." He didn't say: "Take ye and swallow." We parents were told not to let it houch even our teeth.

A. I think your children are being taught better than you and I were. That business about not permitting the host to touch your teeth made "scrupes" out of many children. The proper thing is to receive freely, reverently and with love-with no fear or tension or worry. Actually it is seldom nocessary to chew the host, and it is better not to get particles between your teeth. But eat naturally, swallow naturally, and concentrate your mind on the love of our Lord.

Just to make sure, I checked through my Canon Law, Ritual and moral books and I can't even find In the light of this, a continuance of the existing arms race is a clearly seen insanity because it can only lead to a general holocaust sooner or later. The citizens of this country know, beyond need of proof, that they have the courage and determination to do their duty if the ultimate disaster of total war is forced upon them. They also know they are able to respond to the higher demands on their courage implied in the President's disarmament proposals.




