## DISCUSS COUNCIL DOCUMENTS

### Historic theological parley opens in Rome

ROME — The Church is "missionary by its very nature," a noted Belgian Dominican scholar told the international congress of theologians here. Therefore, he said, it must be "a sign or sacrament to the world of God's saving presence and action."

Father Edward Schillebeeckx, O.P., of the Netherlands University of Nijmegen was one of 12 speakers (Sept. 26) during the first day of the week-long International Congress on the Theology of the Second Vatican Council, which attracted almost 1,400 scholars and teachers of theology from all over the world.

The opening discussions concerned the mystery of the Church, the origin and nature of the office of bishops and the role of Mary in the plan of salvation.

According to the council's Constitution of the Church, Father Schillebeeckx said, "the Church is the universal sacrament as the manifestation of God in the world and more specifically of the whole plan of God for the salvation of the world. In such a view, he said, the idea of a sacrament would be broad enough to include the whole of 'salvation history' itself—a much broader meaning of the word 'sacrament' than medieval theology envisioned.

The Church and the world are not in any sense pitted against each other, he said, since "the Church is the sacrament of the world—that is, a sign through which God's plan for the salvation of the world is most fully, though not completely without shadow, manifest."

**THE OPENING** speaker on the subject of the mystery of the Church was Archbishop Pietro Parente, secretary of the Doctrinal Congregation and a frequent speaker on the subject during the council.

In modern theology particularly, he said, there has emerged a concept, nourished by patristic and biblical sources, of the Church seen in its more profound reality as "mystery." It was this concept which prepared for the council's Constitution on the Nature of the Church and which represents a kind of reaction to the juridical concept of the Church considered only in its "visible, institutional aspect."

The mystery of the Church, Archbishop Parente said, is not a mystery in the sense of an "unknowable secret" or merely a speculative concept. It is the living reality of salvation which has in the Church two dimensions: a vertical one, the union between humanity and God Incarnate; and a horizontal dimension which unites in one unique body the members and head, who is Christ.

#### 1,067 at Marian

Marian College has reported a record 1,067 students enrolled this semester, including 836 full-time students. The freshman class numbers 307 men and women, including 59 student nurses at St. Vincent's School of Nursing. There are 372 resident students on the Marian campus and another 74 enrolled on the Oldenburg extension center campus.

**FATHER HENRI de Lubac, S.J.**, of the Jesuit house of studies at Lyons, France, exploring the meaning of "mystery" as applied to the Church, compared the Church to a moon which receives at each instant its own splendor from the sun, which is Christ, "the unique wellspring of light."

Continuing the theme of the mystery of the Church, Bishop Carlo Colombo, rector of the Milan, Italy, seminary and a theological advisor to Pope Paul said the council insisted, perhaps for the first time in such a clear way, on the unity and universality of salvation in Christ, which embraces in a unique concrete plan of redemption all men of all times. It is a salvation which is realized gradually, he said, as it is inserted into human history.

salvation, he said, the Church is the center of the religious history of the human race prior to and independent of the episcopal college and not merely as individuals.

American Jesuit Father Francis Sullivan of Rome's Gregorian University, discussing the infallibility of the teaching of bishops throughout the world, said that a condition for this infallibility is that bishops should "teach concord in presenting a judgment as definitive." He noted, however, that this could be achieved not only in ecumenical councils, but whenever the bishops act as members of the episcopal college and not merely as individuals.

Passing to a discussion of Mary's role in the plan of salvation, the noted Mariologist, Father Jacques Maritain, O.P., (Continued on page 9)

VATICAN CITY — Fears that the Second Vatican Council's recommendation for the creation of a Church organization to deal with problems of world poverty and development might be ignored have been answered by L'Osservatore Romano, Vatican City daily.

In an unsigned but authoritative article in its edition of September 23, the paper announced that a provisional committee for implementing the organization of a secretariat for the lay apostolate and of an organization to deal with development and social justice is soon to meet in Rome under the chairmanship of Cardinal Maurice Roy of Quebec. No date was given.

The article makes a point of the fact that the provisional committee is to study the establishment of "two" offices. In doing so it answers the fears expressed in various areas that the committee might concentrate only on the establishment of a lay apostolate secretariat and that the other organization would be lost in the process.

L'Osservatore article specifically makes a point of this: "The title of the Committee for the Lay Apostolate, which some have attributed to it, is not exact."

"TWO IN FACT are the organizations recommended by the council, the concrete realization of which is the task of the provisional committee. The first will have to concern itself with specific problems of the lay apostolate and the second with the promotion of social justice. These are problems which are indeed within the competence of laymen but not of them alone."

The provisional committee was established by Pope Paul VI (July 7) under the chairmanship of Cardinal Roy, and includes four lay persons: Miss Rosemary Gollie of Australia, of the Committee of the Permanent Commission for International Congresses of the Lay Apostolate; Dr. Johannes Schauf of Germany; Professor Auguste Vanistendael of Belgium, general secretary of the International Federation of Christian Trade Unions; and Vittorio Veronesi, former secretary of Italian Catholic Action and director general of the National Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization.

In its desire to clarify the scope of the provisional committee's work, the L'Osservatore article stressed the full title of the committee: "The title chosen was—Committee for the Implementation of Article 26 of the Decree 'Apostolic Actuositatem' (Lay Apostolate) and of Article 90 of the Constitution 'Gaudium et Spes' (The Church in the Modern World)."

The lay apostolate article in question specifies that the special secretariat must be set up at the Holy See for aiding and giving impulse to the lay apostolate, as a center which, by suitable means, will start research into problems arising in this field and will assist the hierarchy and laymen in apostolic works by its advice."

ARTICLE 90 of the Constitution on the Church in the Modern World states that the council, considering the immensities

of the hardships which still afflict the greater part of mankind today, regard it as most opportune that an organism of the Universal Church be set up in order that both justice and the love of Christ for the poor might be developed everywhere. The role of such an organism would be to stimulate the Catholic community to promote progress in needy regions and international social justice."

The L'Osservatore article noted that "the committee in its greater implementation of the conciliar principles will bear in mind the conclusions of the various work groups which dealt with the matter."

It is well known that problems of a global nature are carefully considered on the part of the post-conciliar Commission for the Lay Apostolate, of the commission of cardinals for the reform of the curia and lastly of the part of the group of specialists who studied the possible methods for the implementation of article 90 of the pastoral constitution. In the fulfillment of its work the committee will not fail to avail itself of the advice of the persons and organisms which it will consider fitting to consult in order to achieve the speedy realization of its tasks."

### Terre Haute school body organized

TERRE HAUTE, Ind.—Creation of a Terre Haute District School Board, designed to formulate policies for elementary schools and secondary schools in Terre Haute deaconry, has been announced here.

Named chairman of the board was Fred M. Priester, a member of St. Benedict's parish, the only other officer named was a secretary, Richard Finley, of St. Joseph's parish.

The district group will have jurisdiction over the high school, five parish schools in Terre Haute, and parish schools in West Terre Haute, St. Mary-of-the-Woods, Clinton and Brazil. Affiliation will be maintained with the Archdiocesan School Board, which has sanctioned formation of the local group.

Special problems which the special board are expected to handle concern participation in federally-financed education programs, transportation and budget.

Membership will be composed of the pastor and a layman from each parish in the deaconry which maintains a parish school and the principal of Schulte High School.

### Spanish prelate quits state post

TORTOSA, Spain — Tortosa's Bishop Manuel Moll y Sabrid has announced his resignation from Spain's Council of State, the top-level advisory group to which he was named in August, 1965, by the late Spanish Franco.

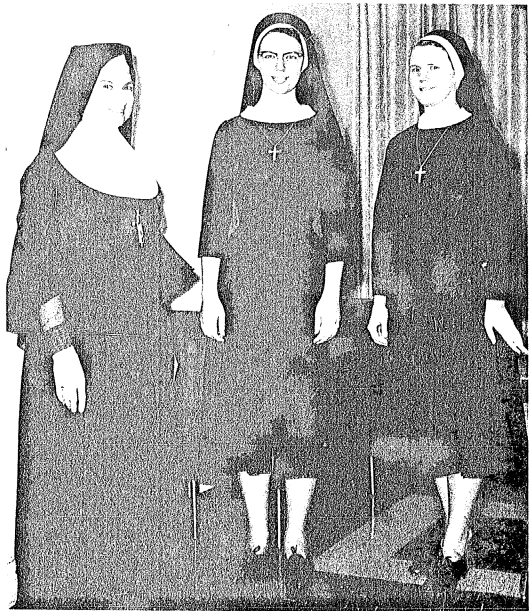
Agreeing that Bishop Moll is not in the best of health, observers here believe that the bishop's resignation was prompted by the growing demands of priests and lay people seeking separation between the Church and the Spanish state.

### West Baden going under the hammer

WEST BADEN, Ind.—The former Jesuit house of studies here, which was once a 700-room residence, will be auctioned for sale November 2, according to W. A. Brennan, Jr., of Indianapolis. Also to be sold are the adjacent 900 acres of land surrounding the eight-story building.

A study is being conducted by the Indiana University Foundation to determine if the property can be used as a national center for the performing arts. The Spring Valley Development Corp. or the West Baden National Arts Foundation, Inc., may buy the property at the auction, according to a spokesman for the corporation.

The former West Baden Springs Hotel, built in the early 1900's, was a lavish playground for the wealthy and famous for years. It was donated to the Society of Jesus (Jesuits) in the 1930's and operated by them until recently, when it became economically unfeasible.

### Papal mission sent to Vietnam

VATICAN CITY—A papal representative is being sent to Vietnam to preside over a special meeting of that country's bishops to discuss Church problems there in the light of the ecumenical council.

Pope Paul VI received Archbishop Sergio Pignedoli, Apostolic Delegate to Canada (Sept. 27), only hours before the Archbishop was scheduled to fly to Saigon.

In a brief news story, separate from the announcement of the audience, L'Osservatore Romano, Vatican City newspaper, said Archbishop Pignedoli will preside in the name of the Supreme Pontiff.

# Text of Pope Paul VI's 'peace' encyclical

VENERABLE brothers, health and apostolic benediction.

It is a solemn custom of the faithful during the month of October to venerate with the prayers of the Rosary a spiritual guardian to the Mother of Christ. This we heartily approve, following the example of our predecessors, and this year we call upon all the children of the Church to perform these special exercises of devotion to the same Most Blessed Virgin. For we are threatened by a

on citizens, the iniquitous plotting, the murder of the innocent. All of these are potential material for the greatest possible tragedy.

IT SEEMS TO US, as it seemed to our more recent predecessors, that a very provident God has committed to us a special task, namely that we labor with patient and persevering effort for the preservation and the strengthening of the peace. This task, as is evident, arises from the fact that we have been entrusted with the governing of the whole Church, which is a sign raised to the nations' (Cfr. Is. 11, 12) does not serve political ends but should convey to the human race the truth and grace of Jesus Christ, its divine author. Actually, from the very beginning of our apostolic ministry, we have neglected no opportunity to use our prayers, entreaties and exhortations for the cause of the peace.

men, we did not cease to urge those who had the responsibility for such a momentous task to ward off from men the monstrous catastrophe which perhaps was about to overwhelm them.

Now again, therefore, we lift up our voice "with piercing cry and with tears" (Job. 5, 7). We very earnestly beseech those who have charge of the public welfare to strive with every means available to prevent the further spread of the conflagration and even to extinguish it entirely. For we do not doubt that all men who sincerely seek what is right and what is just, no matter what their race, color, religion or social status, may be—feel the same way we do.

We cry to them in God's name to stop. Men must come together and work out concrete plans and terms in all sincerity. A settlement should be reached now, even at the expense of some inconvenience or loss; for it may have to be made later in the grant of bitter slaughter and involve great loss.

AT THE SAME time as we are moved to make this anxious declaration, our high responsibility as a pastor indicates to us that we must ask help from on high, since peace, whose benefits are great, that even in earthly mortal affairs no more pleasing man is heard, nothing is desired with greater longing, no more letter can be found (St. Aug., De Civ. Dei, 19, 11; P.L. 41, 637), must be asked from him who is the Prince and King. As the Church in uncertain and troubled times used to turn for refuge to His Mother Mary, a most ready intercessor, it is right for us to direct our attention, yours, venerable brothers, and that of all the faithful to her, who, as St. Irenaeus says, "was made the cause of salvation for the whole human race" (Adv. Haer. 3, 22; P.L. 7, 939).

On the same day, in St. Peter's basilica, at the tomb of the Apostle, we also will hold a special ceremony of supplication in honor of the Virgin Mother of God, the protector of Christians and our intercessor for peace.

During the Second Vatican Council we gave our confirmation of the solemn tradition of the title of Mother of the Church, a title acclaimed by all the council Fathers and the Catholic world.

Men to true and lasting prosperity, to the clergy and to the people entrusted to the care of each of you, the apostolic blessing of the most high Mother of God. We will in her kindness grant our humble prayer, we lovingly grant to you, venerable brother.

## Pope tells why he issued encyclical

VATICAN CITY — Pope Paul VI has declared he issued his new encyclical letter calling for peaceful settlement of war because he is convinced that by speaking out he may be able to reach the men of today and that

the fate of the world can be changed by prayer. Speaking in his first weekly general audience in St. Peter's basilica since he returned to Vatican City from his summer home in Castel Gandolfo, Pope Paul centered his remarks on his encyclical, *Christi Martiri Rosarii*. Among other points, he noted that some may question the effects of his message. "What is the use of it," he asked.

He affirmed his belief that the spoken word still has some value in contemporary history "because of the mystery of truth which is in the world and reveals, because of the unarmed and invincible strength it has when it is free, sincere and real, and because of the faith we have in men."

Likewise, the Pope declared, "we pray... And we are convinced that to pray is not in vain. It is the condition for the realization of the mysterious workings of the divine goodness within the unweakened and unchangeable of human affairs."

U Thant praises encyclical on peace prayers

UNITED NATIONS — Pope Paul VI's encyclical appealing for prayers for peace was greeted with warm welcome and praise by United Nations Secretary General U Thant.

THE PRESIDENT said that it takes force, power, money and propaganda to bring about an effective settlement of world problems, the Pope answered that his policy was and is: "We can speak out and pray."

He affirmed his belief that the spoken word still has some value in contemporary history "because of the mystery of truth which is in the world and reveals, because of the unarmed and invincible strength it has when it is free, sincere and real, and because of the faith we have in men."

Commenting on the papal encyclical, L'Osservatore Romano noted: "If a will to negotiate exists, the only true condition to be posed is that one should meet without delay, before the situation worsens still further, because the other possible condition—reduction and withdrawal of military forces and guarantees for freedom and independence for the Vietnamese people—can be achieved after and not before negotiations."

Layman to direct diocesan business

PUEBLO, Colo. — The Pueblo diocese has decided to engage a layman as full-time business manager. The decision was made at a meeting of the bishop's advisory committee and approved by Bishop Charles A. Buswell, who commented: "It is significant that the first decision made by the newly formed advisory council was to hire a layman on a full-time basis as business manager. He said applications for the job now are being accepted by the committee. The manager will perform duties directed by the bishop to facilitate efficient operation of material and financial programs of the diocese."

WASHINGTON — President Lyndon B. Johnson has declared U.S. support for the appeal for peace made by Pope Paul VI in his new encyclical letter. The President said at a press conference (Sept. 21) that "we will do anything we can" to encourage the Pope's peace plea and also to support any possible negotiations for a peaceful settlement of the war in Vietnam. President Johnson said he was "very happy to see the Pope take the interest he has," adding that "we want to do anything we can to encourage and support him in any move he may make."

He said the U.S. would rather talk peace than fight a war. But America cannot do this, he added, so long as aggressors go on fighting and refuse peace negotiations. The U.S., he stated, is eager to pursue any proposal for peace talks made by North Vietnam, but he said that there are no indications that there are any such proposals. He noted that he believed that the Soviet Union would like to see a negotiated settlement of the war in Vietnam. The President also voiced support of the peace efforts of United Nations Secretary General U Thant, but said there is no indication that North Vietnam has been responsive to U Thant's efforts to achieve a settlement.

Peace plea is lauded by Hartke ZURICH, Switzerland—United States Senator Vance Hartke, of Indiana, here for international monetary discussions, has warmly approved of appeals for world peace made by Pope Paul VI. A longtime advocate of a holding action in South Vietnam, Senator Hartke has been a Senate leader in opposing the war's escalation because of the risk of triggering a world war. The full text of the Hartke statement in Zurich follows: "I am encouraged by the eloquent plea of Pope Paul for world peace. His words and his prayers are directed primarily for peace in Southeast Asia, calling for members of his church to pray for an end to war during the coming month. As a Senator of the United States, and as a veteran of World War II, I have many times urged that peace negotiations be fostered through the United Nations or via a third Geneva Conference. I am sincerely pleased to join Pope Paul in his reiterated wishes for an early end to the conflict in Asia. "It is significant that Pope Paul's latest efforts follow a weekend in which U Thant, a world statesman and himself an Asian, made a special plea for peace, a week-end in which Richard Goodwin, former President, Presidents Kennedy and Johnson, called for de-escalation in Vietnam. "A troubled world can take heart from these appeals. Hopefully, they will each make contributions toward an early settlement of a war which could engulf the world."

OMAHA, Neb.—Modern woman—married, single, nun or widow—can find the best image of womanhood in the description of the "valiant woman" of the Book of Proverbs, Archbishop Paul J. Hallinan of Atlanta, Ga., said here.

The archbishop told a convention of the Archdiocesan Council of Catholic Women the word "valiant" is related to "valor" and "value."

"Woman's courage," he said, "is certified in the high praise, she is clothed with strength; her value is attested by her proven worth; tender and thoughtful, she is dressed in strength and dignity."

"This is the kind of woman," the archbishop said, "that the world and society require, and that the Church and religion need."

"Each was a woman—some wives, some single, some widows," the archbishop said. "At the pinnacle of our tradition, according to Archbishop Hallinan, 'there is Mary the Virgin, who stands for innocence and integrity, and Mary the Mother, who stands for love of her husband and care of her son.'"

"The human nature of all men is here, but so is the feminine personality. She is, in the word of Vatican Council II, the sign of certain hope and solace for the pilgrim People of God," he said.

WOMAN'S ROLE will never be understood, the archbishop said, until she is revealed as a person with human needs—not a biological deviation, a social appendage or an economic competitor.

"Happiness," he said, "is need that is fulfilled, unhappiness is need that is hidden and frustrated. But these are human, not feminine qualities. There is a need in the spirit of all men and women.

Teaching and healing were cited by the archbishop as women's traditional roles.

"The giving and the sacrifice mark woman's personality in contemporary fiction, and the world and the Church reflect this image," he said. "It is man who dominates history, but it is woman who stands, not for history, but for the generation. Peoples and nations need good mothers as much as children do."

"Woman's place among the People of God," the archbishop said, "must be free, vital and dynamic, marked by sacrifice and compassion. If it is not, then her dignity is diminished, and worse, the Church's vigor is impaired."

## Pontiff issues letter on use of Latin

VATICAN CITY—Pope Paul VI has issued a letter confirming the decision to restrict the use of the vernacular and to retain Latin as the usual language in the daily choir office of monks and certain other Religious clerics.

The letter dated August 15, was reported in the Italian press in connection with the chapter general of the Confederation of Benedictines now meeting in Rome. Although the text was not immediately released by the Vatican to the press, its contents were reliably confirmed.

COMMENTING on the letter, Msgr. Frederick McManus, director of the U.S. Bishops' Commission for the Liturgical Apostolate, who was in Rome, noted that it in no way affects the use of the vernacular in the parish liturgy. Neither is it directed to Sisters, Brothers or Religious priests who recite the office in common, he said. It is for religious institutes of clerics such as Benedictines, Dominicans or Carmelites, who have the formal obligation to celebrate the

choir office each day in Latin, Msgr. McManus said.

The letter cites the Second Vatican Council's views as expressed in its Constitution on the Liturgy in 1963 and other documents based on the constitution—a general instruction implementing the constitution of October 26, 1964, and another instruction issued November 23, 1965, on the same subject.

THE LETTER asks for faithful observance of these decisions and the Pope expressed his intention not to modify them at the present time when all Catholics should conform to the council's decisions. But, Msgr. McManus pointed out, Pope

## Financial rights of Church stressed

VATICAN CITY—A high Vatican official has hailed the publication of a new study on the Church's financial rights in the light of the Second Vatican Council as an "extremely important event."

In an article introducing the volume, L'Osservatore Romano (Sept. 24), Archbishop Giacomo Violardo, secretary of the Sacred Congregation on the Discipline of the Sacraments, said that there has never been available before such a complete and authoritative study of the Church's right to tax and the regional laws which coordinate this right with the secular society.

ENTITLED "The Church's Right of Taxation According to Existing Discipline," the book was published by the Rome office of Desclée Co., Inc., its author, Msgr. Antonio Mancini, is chief of protocol of the Vatican Secretariat of State and a consultant of the Pontifical Commission for the Revision of Code of Canon Law. For several years he was a judge of the Rome vicariate's matrimonial court.

"In the climate created by the ecumenical council in which the Church has been studying ways of abolishing the barrier separating it from people," Archbishop Violardo said, "it is more than fitting, and necessary, to remind those above all who have economic responsibilities in the various levels of today's social structure, the sacred ministry to which the clergy in its various branches and sectors dedicates itself has no other immediate practical explanation except that of truly and properly rendering service to the society of believers. This service is all the more necessary and precious when one considers the loftier goals which inspire and sustain it."

## Pontiff issues letter on use of Latin

Paul also confirmed the possibility of concessions on the vernacular choir office when the office is celebrated with a congregation of the laity present. Various possibilities of this sort have been listed in the November, 1965, instruction.

In his letter the Pope warned those with the obligation of daily choir office to be wary of favoring over the Latin language and Gregorian chant and reducing the choir office to an undramatized recitation. He also stressed that the churches in which the office is now chanted might lose the attraction they have for the faithful who want to hear it chanted in the ancient language and form of the Church.

## Abp. Hoban Seminary to open in West Berlin

CLEVELAND — Solemn Pontifical Requiem Mass for Archbishop Edward Francis Hoban, bishop of Cleveland, who served 45 of his 88-year life span in the U.S. hierarchy, was offered in St. John's Cathedral here.

Before a capacity congregation of mourners, who included archbishops and bishops, government officials, priests, Religious and the laity, Archbishop Egidio Vagnozzi, Apostolic Delegate in the United States, was the principal celebrant of the Mass. Burial was in the crypt of the cathedral.

Archbishop Hoban, who has been in failing health for several years, died (Sept. 22) in his suburban residence.

The prelate, who was a priest for 63 years, served as a bishop in Chicago and Rockford, Ill., before he came to Cleveland in 1943.

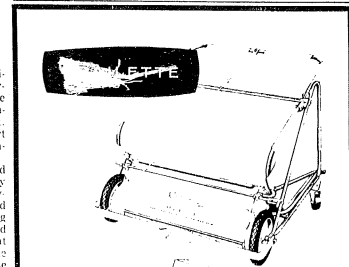
Because of advanced age and failing health, the archbishop asked the Holy See to be relieved of active government of the Cleveland diocese in 1964. He retained his title as bishop of Cleveland while the administrative duties were taken over by Coadjutor Bishop Clarence G. Isenmann, who was given the right of succession.

Bishop Isenmann, 59, former auxiliary bishop of Cincinnati and bishop of Columbus, became the seventh bishop of Cleveland upon Archbishop Hoban's death.

Guaranteed annual wage no longer a pipe dream

On June 30, Bishop John J. Carberry of Columbus, Ohio, came out very forthrightly in favor of a guaranteed annual income... significantly, did so with impunity.



...even, in some cases, by sophisticated reformers—as a "kickback" but slightly "fruity" crank who didn't know enough to come in out of the rain.

The second is a device generally known as "negative income taxation" or "negative rates taxation" Under this proposal payments to the poor would be calculated on the basis of the unused exemptions and deductions to which these non-taxpayers would be entitled if they were paying taxes, or, more simply, on the basis of the amount by which their income falls below the predetermined poverty level.

The smart money in Washington says that budget strains and political caution will rule out either of these two frontal approaches in the short run.

Two major approaches are currently being considered. The first would make use of existing public assistance programs, but would extend their coverage to all those now living in poverty and would increase the benefits to guarantee everyone an income up to some predetermined level.

coverage and payments, more rent supplement money and other subsidies for low-income families, and more public employment for poor people who can't find private work.

According to this theory, Mr. Otten concludes, "benefits under these and other programs would be increased, and more and more poor people would be given some sort of help. A few years hence, it's figured, almost every needy family would actually be getting enough government help to rise out of poverty. Thus, the end result would be much the same as that of the negative income tax and kindred schemes."

I suspect that Mr. Otten's reading of the Administration's tea leaves is reasonably accurate. In other words, I am inclined to share his opinion that political realism may compel the Administration to rule out—in the short run, at least—a direct frontal approach to this problem.

This may not be the best possible way of implementing the concept of the guaranteed income, but if, realistically, it's the only feasible way of going about it, so be it. The important thing is to keep moving in the right direction.

The civil rights bill

There will be a lot of post-mortem about what happened to this year's civil rights bill in the Senate. Predictably the Negro leaders are disappointed, and are threatening dire consequences from the defeat.



On the fact of the whole matter it seems reasonable enough and certainly moral that a man should be able to buy a house or rent an apartment whenever he can afford it, and regardless of the color of his skin.

Unfortunately, the clear-cut morality of the case is hampered by many other factors. For one thing, the law runs counter to the ancient Anglo-Saxon legal principle that a man's home is his castle.

This neighborhood idea, founded as it is in our jurisprudence and our idea of free association, has been a hard nut to crack.

Another, though little discussed, problem of the present piece of civil rights legislation has been the poor construction of the law.

What effect has the growth of the "black power" concept had upon the death of the law? I suppose this will prove impossible to adjudge.

How many will try to weigh all the underlying factors which, brought about the death of the bill?

The most visible cause of defeat is the open-housing act...

Some will claim that this has been a major factor in the defeat; some will say that it has had a little importance. Since I have no way of knowing, I will not say at all.

I think, perhaps, the report released by the Ribicoff subcommittee on September 3rd of this year has had some effect upon the defeat of the bill.

The Attorney General's department insists that they will be back plugging for more civil rights laws in the next session of Congress. This is reasonable enough. Let us hope, however, that they will draw up the bill more carefully next time, and thus give it a better chance of passing.

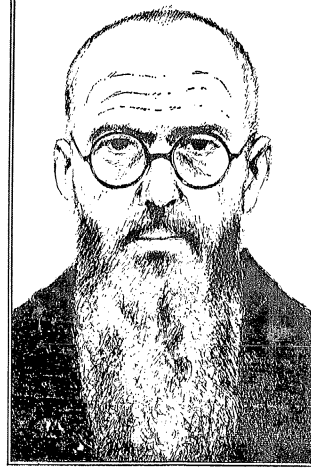

"There have been times in the history of the Church and this is one of them," the bishop said, "when the number goes into the priesthood is very small."

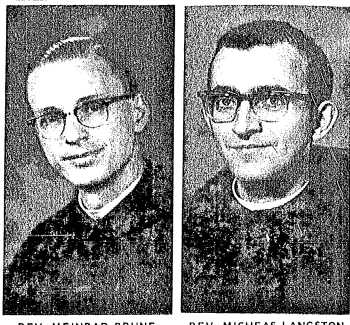

Last week Pope Paul summoned the world's Catholics to say the Rosary during the establishment of true peace, the halting of war and the removal of attitudes which tend to foster war. . . . "We cry to them (world leaders) in God's name to stop," the Pontiff pleaded. "Men must come together and work out concrete plans and terms in all sincerity. A settlement should be reached now even at the expense of some inconvenience or loss; for it may have to be made later in the train of bitter slaughter and involve great loss."

We await Father Lyons' comments on that.

(Continued from page 1) praised the council's teaching on Mary contained in the Constitution on the Nature of the Church for its moderation and its orderly summary of the Church's preaching on this subject in recent times.

He said the council "gave the function of Mary preponderance over her privileges, which he speaks a notable ecumenical opening in the Church's Mariology." Mary's cooperation in the work of salvation, he said, "consists of her assent to the Incarnation which is a permanent and enduring aspect in the Church even today. Her consent, he said, made Christ present and makes it possible for us to consent to the divine plan of salvation through Christ as well.

In AN ADDRESS read at the opening session, Pope Paul VI reminded the theologians of the Church for following the Church's teaching authority in essentials while they exercise freedom in investigating the meaning of the ecumenical council's documents.

The teachings of the council, he said, "constitutes proximate and universal norms of truth from which it is not permissible for theologians to depart in their studies."

But within the limits of the Church's teaching authority, he continued, there is "a vast area of research" in which the theologian's liberty is assured and "in this legitimate liberty itself the progress of theology finds its foundation."

The Pope's remarks were contained in a letter addressed to Cardinal Giuseppe Pizzardo, director of the Institute of Seminars and Universities, and read by Archbishop Dino Staffa, the congregation's secretary.

Quoting St. Augustine, Pope Paul asked that theologians follow this norm: "In essentials, unity; in non-essentials, liberty, and in all things charity."

Among the list of prominent scholars and theologians scheduled to address the Congress was Father Karl Rahner, S.J., Father Yves Congar, O.P., Father Jean Daniélou, S.J., Father Pierre Benoit, O.P., and Father John Courtney Murray, S.J.

# Notre Dame with host international conference

NOTRE DAME, Ind.—Thirty Germans distinguished in theology, philosophy, law and history will join American specialists in these fields at the University of Notre Dame here for an international conference October 10 to 14.

Cardinal Julius Döpfner of Munich, will head the European group which will include several officials of the West German government. The cardinal and Father Theodore M. Hesbarrh, C.S.C., university president, will chairmen of the conference on the condition of Western Man: The Problem of Freedom and Authority.

THE CONFERENCE will examine a number of related subjects, including Church-State relationships in contemporary Europe; authority versus freedom in totalitarian systems; and the reconciliation of freedom and authority in the American Revolution.

## 'Church Freedom' Institute formed in New York City

NEW YORK—Formation of an Institute for Freedom in the Church was announced at a press conference here.

It was said the institute, with a board of 20 members, 10 priests, nuns and lay persons, was formed to deal with the recurring problems of personal freedom within the institutional structures of the church.

A statement of purpose said the group sees a "lack of channels for communication and mediation in the Church." Lack of "creative machinery" and a current "polarization" within the Church in its own persons of freedom.

Eugene Funtrell of Queens College, chairman of the institute's board, said at the press conference that the organization will not evade "rendering a judgment on a controversial matter which we feel that a judgment is called for" but that "we have no intention of immediately leaping into every conflict situation that now exists in the Church."

Other members of the institute's board present at the press conference were Daniel Callahan of Commonwealth, William Omega book publisher, Father William Clancy of the Pittsburgh Oratory, and Richard Hordley program director of the National Conference of Christians and Jews.

# Pope praises work of Bible scholars

ROME—The work of the biblical exegetes shines in the teaching office of the Church, Pope Paul VI said. "It is necessary, therefore, that it be faithful to that teaching authority Jesus Christ entrusted to the Church, and that it be a true and objective, human word deprived of its inherent force."

Speaking to Scripture professors participating in the 1963 Italian Biblical Week here, the Pope described to them the duties of a biblical scholar. "The word of God passes through you to other minds, to the people of God," he said. "You are a merely philosophical, scientific and objective in the divers sciences which aid in the understanding of sacred Scripture. You are professors of Sacred Scripture. You are exegetes."

"We mean 'exegetes' not only in the philosophical, technical or scientific sense, but in the sense of all in the theological sense, in the religious and spiritual sense. In other words, you are recognized as these who explain and transmit in its profound and vital integrity the word of God. You are interpreters," the Pope continued.

"NOW THIS office, in its decisive claim to giving true value to that transcendent Word, is larger than man. It demands a faithfulness which is not realized by private interpretation" (II Peter 1:20). You know this. Your office shares in the teaching authority of the Church. It is necessary, therefore, that it be faithful to that teaching authority lest it change the word of God into a subjective, human word deprived of its inherent force."

## Stresses enduring role of Catholic education

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn.—A top U.S. Catholic educator asserted here: "Catholic education will never be abandoned. It will be re-evaluated, restructured; its physical and human resources will be reappportioned."

But it has a contribution to make and it will make it," Msgr. James C. Donohue, director of the Education Department, National Catholic Welfare Conference, told some 3,000 teachers and administrators at the annual Minnesota Catholic Educational Association forum. In this era of criticism of Catholic education, the monsignor said there is need of a new vision for Catholic schools, a vision which emphasizes professionalism.

THIS VISION must speak to the heart of the human condition, must arouse wonder which is the only unfulfilling antidote to boredom, he said.

**Asks prayers**  
NASHVILLE, Tenn.—Dr. H. Franklin Paschal, president of the Southern Baptist Convention, called here on the 10.7 million-member denomination to join Catholics in praying for world peace. The churchman noted that Catholics have been urged by Pope Paul VI to ask aside the month of October as a time for "praying for peace." "I should like to see Christian groups and all concerned individuals join in this special prayer," Dr. Paschal said. "Together we may achieve amazing results."

## Foster parent 'image' changed, survey shows

A recent survey in the Indianapolis area has disclosed that Catholic foster parents, as a group, are getting younger, better educated and more affluent. This was indicated by results of a study of Catholic Social Services' 26 newest foster homes. The study was done by the Carvers in Social Work students assigned to the agency this past summer. Their interviewing and tabulating was supervised by members of the agency's family and children's services department.

**FINDINGS** of the latest study were compared with one made in early 1965 by the Indiana University School of Social Service. A third of the homes in the IU survey were in the Catholic Social Services program. The others were Children's Bureau homes.

Well over half of those interviewed last summer were in the 25 to 29 age bracket. In the earlier study, over half were middle-aged 40 to 50.

Not only was the percentage of high school graduates higher in the new study, but also the number with college training. In the Catholic Social Services survey, 15% of the foster fathers had college degrees compared to 2% in the IU study.

The income level was much higher. Over three-fourths interviewed last summer had annual incomes of over \$6,000, while fewer than half of those in the 1965 study did.

**MOST FAMILIES** in both studies were composed of both natural and foster children. There was some increase in the number of natural children per home—2.6 as against 2.3—and decrease in the number of foster children—1.3 average versus 2.2.

The foster children in the more recently surveyed homes tended to fall in the same age brackets as the natural children. The majority interviewed both times preferred noncenter placement of foster children rather than that of a few weeks or months.

When asked how they heard about the foster parent program, "newspapers" and "friends" were the most common answers.

## New Orleans hosts Charities parley

NEW ORLEANS—"Catholic Charities in the Modern World" will engage the attention of some 1,500 persons involved in combating modern social problems during national meetings here October 7 to 13.

The occasion will be the 52nd annual joint convention of the National Conference of Catholic Charities and the Society of St. Vincent de Paul, and the third biennial meeting of the Association of Ladies of Charity of the United States.

Topics to be discussed at the conference will include programs for strengthening family life; volunteer aid; world hunger, mental health, community service; the war on poverty; work for the aged; governmental participation in social welfare; and the application of Vatican council documents to the Catholic Charities movement.
